Adam to Us Teacher: LaChrisha Randle Grade Level 6th-8th

Course Description:

This class teaches history through literature and writing while exploring Notgrass' Adam to Us world history. Integration of all three subjects helps to make the subject of history more cohesive, more relatable and more enjoyable for the student to grasp. The history is taught based on Notgrass' Adam to Us. Students will read one unit per week which contains 5 lessons, all taught from a biblical worldview. The literature utilized is living books or historical fiction to help the eras and people studied come alive for the student. The writing portion of the class is taught using Institute for Excellence in Writing, World History Based Writing and often centers around the history being studied or the literature being read. The class will include vocabulary, weekly reading, internet research, and regular writing. In the literature portion of class, the student will examine the author, character, plot, setting, theme, conflict, other literary devices and elements of style. Students will learn literary terms and how to simply analyze and comprehend literature through the use of dialectic journal entries. Writing will focus on several genres, build up to and consist mostly of 5 paragraph essays and culminate with a super essay, which is several paragraphs and pages long. Although, it may sound like a lot, and while it may gently challenge your student to level up academically, this class serves to inspire students to begin to take responsibility for their academic success. Through the years, this has happened for the advanced as well as the struggling student.

Algebra 1 Teacher: Kris Johanson Grade Level 8th-12th

Course Description:

Welcome to Algebra I, the foundation for high school mathematics. In this 2-semester course we will cover linear equations, graphing, exponents, polynomials, factoring, quadratic equations, etc. The Prentice Hall textbook is a classic text, has been used in private and public schools for many, many years, and there is an almost endless variety of supplemental resources, online videos, and workbooks/worksheets that you can find for sale or free if you wish to supplement the textbook. Only the textbook is required for the class, however. The class will be "fun but structured". We will open with a brief devotional and prayer to get our minds focused. I will then explain the new material. Be ready to take notes and ask questions during the lecture! You will have a chance to bring up questions from the prior week. If time permits, I may ask you to work on a problem. I will assign a set of homework problems that you can complete in Canvas®. Parents will be able to view their student's progress in Canvas anytime.

Algebra 2 Teacher: Kris Johanson Grade Level 10th-12th

Course Description:

In this 2-semester course we will pick up from Algebra 1 with graphing, exponents, polynomials, quadratic equations, logs, etc. The Prentice Hall textbook is a classic text, has been used in private and public schools for many, many years, and there is an almost endless variety of supplemental resources, online videos, and workbooks/worksheets that you can find for sale or free if you wish to supplement the textbook. Only the textbook is required for the class, however. The class will be "fun but structured". We will open with a brief devotional and prayer to get our minds focused. I will then explain the new material. Be ready to take notes and ask questions during the lecture! You will have a chance to bring up questions from the prior week. If time permits, I may ask you to work on a problem. I will assign a set of homework problems that you can complete in Canvas[®]. Parents will be able to view their student's progress in Canvas anytime.

Algebra 2 is typically taken in the 10th or 11th grades, but any high school student who has passed Algebra 1 is encouraged to take the course.

American Literature Teacher: Paige Lozano Grade Levels 9th-12th

Course Description:

This course will introduce the student to the major movements within American Literature. Framed from a Biblical worldview, the student will be expected to read and attend class prepared to engage in a Socratic discussion based on the themes and concepts found within each text. All titles are due in full at the first week assigned unless otherwise noted. Class time will be divided equally between Socratic discussion and writing instruction. Writing assignments for the whole year will include 5 academic essays (prompts varying), 1 creative writing assignment, and 1 final research paper project.

Human Anatomy and Physiology Teacher: Kris Johanson Grade Level 9th-12th

Course Description:

A High School level course that investigates the structure and function of the human body to include several dissections. We will be covering statistics in physiology, chemistry of life, cells & tissues, integumentary (skin) system, muscular-skeletal movement, neurophysiology, heart & cardiovascular, human nutrition, and related topics.


Materials Required:

Course Description

This is an introductory Biology course for college bound students, with instructional support and inquiry-based labs. The class covers the standard California high school Biology curriculum, including, chemistry of life, cells and cellular functions, DNA, genetics, and taxonomy.

Prerequisites: Completion of Physical Science and concurrent enrollment in Algebra I is recommended.

British Literature Teacher: Teri Myers Grade Levels 11th-12th

Course Description:

British Literature is a challenging high school English course examining the works of British authors against an historical backdrop. The course exposes students to classic works from early Anglo-Saxon texts to post-modern pieces, including epics, legends, poetry, novels, philosophy, mystery, romance, science fiction, drama, and satire.

For each work, students learn brief background information, important literature terms, and pertinent vocabulary. Students also engage in Socratic lead discussions often primed by the answering of thought provoking comprehension questions. By the end of the year, students will have written three five-paragraph essays, a seven to ten page research paper, and several creative pieces. Note that written work undergoes a process using steps explained in a notebook I provide for each student called The P.O.W.E.R. Tools of Academic Writing. This streamlined resource offers tools for students as they Prepare, Organize, Write, Edit, and Revise their written work. Knowledge of Modern Language Association (MLA) notation is ideal, but not required as I am happy to assist students in learning this citation method.

Chemistry Teacher: Juliette Lee Grade Levels 10th-12th

Course Description:

This is an introductory Chemistry course for college bound students, with instructional support and inquiry-based labs. The class covers the standard California high school Chemistry curriculum, including properties of matter, the atom, the periodic table, stoichiometry, chemical compositions and reactions, the mole and molarity.

Middle School Writing: Foundations of Writing Teacher: Teri Myers Grade Levels 6th-9th

Course Description:

Middle school provides an amazing opportunity to solidify a student's fundamentals before taking on the rigors of high school level assignments. As a result, while reading dynamic literature, Foundations of Writing reviews the basic elements of composition, including grammar, punctuation, and various types of composition. The course starts off with reviewing parts of speech, moving to effective sentences, continuing toward elements of a well-constructed paragraph, and ending with three and five paragraph essays. The types of writing explored include descriptive, narrative, expository, persuasive, comparison, responsive, creative, correspondence, note taking, and research. Other aspects of this class include spelling tests, vocabulary building, literature discussions, and literature analysis. This class is recommended for students in grades 6-8.

General Science Teacher: Juliette Lee Grade Levels 6th-8th

Course Description:

Apologia's 6th-8th grade Exploring Creation with General Science explores topics in general science: among which include the scientific method, designing experiments, simple machines, geology, archaeology, and biology with apologetics interwoven throughout. Hands-on experiments occur almost weekly, giving students practical lab experience as they discover the principles behind science and learn how to record and report data and present a monthly lab report. There will be monthly tests in class. This course will prepare your student for Apologia Physical Science the following year. This is a rigorous course and parent follow-up with their student is necessary for student success.

Geometry Teacher: Julie Brennan Grade Levels 9th-12th

Course Description:

This course combines direct teaching and discovery activities to learn geometry. Students investigate and learn basic geometric concepts such as properties of shapes and figures, constructions, and theorems. They learn to read and interpret problems mathematically, calculate measurements of plane and solid geometric figures, construct logical arguments, and justify theorems and other results in geometry. There is an emphasis on learning to creatively use properties of geometric figures to solve real-world applications, using a variety of tools and techniques including algebraic methods to problem solve.

***Biweekly hybrid course: This class meets Mondays in person, Wednesdays on Zoom, for a total of 160 minutes of weekly class time. Students monitor a bulletin-board class website for assignments and announcements and submit graded work to an online grade book. Homework is assigned for home study days.

Required Materials:

Your student will need a set of geometry tools (compass and protractor), a sturdy 1-1/2" 3-ring binder, and a scientific calculator.

Prerequisites:

Proficiency with Algebra I concepts and skills. Algebra 1 will be reviewed throughout this course to retain skills needed for future courses.

Government and Economics Teacher: LaChrisha Randle Grade Levels 10th-12th

Course Description:

This class will explore the American government for one semester and economics for one semester. The class focuses on reading from the assigned text, Socratic discussion, class participation, weekly current events, group and individual projects, personal finance implementing Dave Ramsey principles and essays based on assigned text or internet study. Several quizzes and two finals, one for government and one for economics, will be given. Weekly homework requires a daily time commitment and internet access for research. Grades are based on a combination of all of the above requirements, but class participation and homework completion hold the bulk of each semester grade. The class is taught from a Christian worldview and government and economic principles are continuously tested against the word of God. Google classroom is utilized for class management, grading, posted homework assignments and the student will turn work in on this site.

Introduction to Literature Teacher: Juliette Lee Grade Levels 8th-12th

Course Description:

Introduction to Literature offers an opportunity to explore various genres while learning and practicing the skills necessary for consistently producing sound academic essays as well as having opportunities to discover one's personal writing style. In regard to literature, the class studies the following genres: fiction, nonfiction, drama, mystery, poetry, science fiction, and fantasy. For each work, students learn brief background information, important literature terms, and pertinent vocabulary. Students also engage in Socratic lead discussions often primed by having them answer thought provoking comprehension questions. In regard to composition, students write three five-paragraph essays, prepare a five to seven page research paper, produce creative works both in and out of class, and complete one multimedia presentation. Written work undergoes a process using steps explained in a notebook I provide for each student called The P.O.W.E.R. Tools of Academic Writing. This streamlined resource offers tools for students as they Prepare, Organize, Write, Edit, and Revise their written work.

In addition, the class aims to sharpen students in the following areas:

Libertas Teacher: Orlando Duarte Grade Levels 10th-12th

Course Description:

A discussion focused class that will explore the American experience of liberty from its beginnings through recent times in order to help students engage in society and politics. Libertas will focus on many topics to further enhance an understating of American liberty through a study of many themes in history and US government involving topics such as the contribution of Western heritage, American exceptionalism, Federalism and Republicanism, original intent of founding documents, free-market capitalism and the application of these and others in our current day.

Physical Science Teacher: Marilyn Sniffen Grade Levels 8th-10th

Course Description:

This is an introductory Physical Science course with instructional support and hands-on inquiry-based labs. The class covers the standard California middle/ high school physical science curriculum, including Chemistry of Matter, Physics of motion, Electricity and Magnetism, Wave and Particle Motion.

Romantic British Literature Teacher: Paige Lozano Grade Levels 9th-12th

Course Description:

This course will introduce the student to the major nuances and proponents of British Romantic Literature. Framed from a Biblical worldview, the student will be expected to read and attend class prepared to engage in a Socratic discussion based on the themes and concepts found within each text. All titles are due in full at the first week assigned unless otherwise noted. Class time will be divided equally between Socratic discussion and writing instruction. Writing assignments for the whole year will include 5 academic essays (prompts varying), 1 creative writing assignment, and 1 final research paper project.

Spanish 1 Teacher: Bibi Ceballos Grade Levels 6th-9th

Course Description:

This course focuses on communication in everyday situations and in church and missions' settings. Other elements that are emphasized in this course are: grammar (with emphasis on verb conjugation and sentence structure), idiomatic expressions (and comparison between English and Spanish), vocabulary (with special mention of true and false cognates), and pronunciation (to be able to read early in spite of incomplete comprehension). The spotlight will be on the Spanish that is spoken in the United States and Mexico/Central America and on the great variety of Spanish vocabulary that exists throughout the Spanish- speaking countries. Students will be engaged with dialogues, games, songs, personal compositions, and skits.

***Zoom Office Hour

During the week, a Zoom office hour will be offered to practice conversation, answer students' questions on the homework, and prepare for upcoming tests. Although the Zoom hour won't be required, it is highly recommended. Day and time to be announced.

This course begins with a focus on early American history, colonization, the American Revolution, establishment of government, growth in the 19th century, Civil War and Reconstruction, closing of the frontier, the Industrial Revolution, the World Wars, and recent developments of the United States. This course will engage students through various independent and collaborative activities on-ground and online, review games, minimal lectures, and readings of historical primary and secondary documents.

Course Description:

This course will also focus on the Renaissance, Reformation, Age of Discovery, Enlightenment, Age of Revolutions, Nationalism and Imperialism, the World Wars, and developments since World War II as the world has integrated into a more global society. Special emphasis is given to the legacies of Western civilization in the formation of our current Western world. This course will engage students through various independent and collaborative activities on-ground and online, review games, minimal lectures, and readings of historical primary and secondary documents.

Writing Building Blocks Teacher: Julie Anderson Grade Levels 5th-6th

Course Description

This upper elementary class provides weekly writing practice in a safe environment that encourages creativity and critical thinking. Varied activities involve experimenting with words and ideas, while also playing with sentences and paragraphs to increase writing fluency. We explore stories and passages from children's literature, poetry, and the Bible which provide the raw materials to think and write as well as to memorize and recite. Writing becomes less intimidating as students write together as a class and then write on their own with supportive feedback from the teacher. Grammar, mechanics, vocabulary, and literary analysis are included. Everything is designed to help prepare students for middle and high school writing.
